also in trouble. British Rail is expected to crash £20million into the red and British Steel could make a loss this year.

The figures blow a hole in Government claims that the economy will start to pick up in the autumn. A total of 23,161 businesses collapsed in the first at risk — but big names are half of this year, said business

information specialists Dun and Bradstreet.

That is 66 per cent up on the 13,898 in the same period in 1990. Worst-hit regions were the East Midlands and South West.

A London Business School survey predicts longer dole queues - with white-collar jobs being worst affected. About a

million jobs will be lost in banking, insurance and other "service industries" in 1991 and 1992.

British Rail losses, to be announced on Wednesday, will compare with a surplus of £269.8million last year.

Frightened

British Steel is today expected to announce 1990 profits of £250million — down two thirds.

It could plunge into the red this year, with the threat of thousands of job losses.

June car sales are 30 per cent down on last year. Sales of barely 1.5million are predicted this year, the worst figure since 1977.

Experts say people frightened of losing their jobs are afraid to spend - so more businesses suffer.

Economist Gerald Lyons said: "We think the recession will last the whole of the year."


